It is also the month of discovery, as children have been taught about the discovery of America and Christopher Columbus's part in that discovery. In fact many people will get the day off in remembrance of the great explorer's work.

Almost 500 years ago a young monk took a serious look at his world. He realized that everything in Germany was not exactly kosher. It made him think and rethink his position on things as a Roman Catholic theologian. "Surely there is something wrong with the system." he thought. And there was.

Almost 500 years ago the young monk wanted answers to questions about God that bothered him and that plagued his mind. The questions were not only personal but would have bearing on his whole world and on the world for centuries to come. I am talking about a real "world serious." I am talking about a time when the

October, it is the month of many things or many world was about to go through a major overhaul, a undertaking that would reform not so many other generally held positions in a number of disciplines.

> Luther was not the first to consider his world in a serious manner. Many had come before him and others would follow after him. Yet Luther brought the serious nature of Salvation and Grace to the table in a way that it was never brought to the table before. And

although the month goes by with so many people focused upon the surrounding beauty of the land, or a remembrance of America's discovery shortly before Luther's own discovery in the theological landscape, or of a fixation upon a sphere, a bat, several bases and a ball park, perhaps it is time to reflect upon a real "world serious" that is to consider something that has had an impact upon our world and culture for so many centuries. Consider the Reformation in this month of October. Rent a DVD, read a book, Google the word on your computer and take some time to consider the miracle of that time. The year was 1517. The setting was a church in Wittenberg. The happening was a nailing upon a door. The world as peasants and kings, princes and commoners knew it then would never

# Senior High Youth Group (CrossRoads):








# Our Sincere Appreciation






# NEED TO GET INFORMATION TO CERTAIN MEMBERS OF OUR CONGREGATION?

# October 4: The Israelites Worship a Golden Calf

Somehow, as adults today, we still replace the presence and power of almighty God with pitiful substitute gods destined to both disappoint and destroy. Rather than drinking from God's endless spring of satisfying Living Water, we dig cracked, leaky holding tanks to collect stagnant water (Jeremiah 2:13). We chase false gods and buy into the lies of the ungratifying secular culture around us.

Bible Point: Only God deserves our worship.

Key Verse: Exodus 20:2-3

# October 11: The Israelites Build the Tabernacle

Too often adults see people flourishing in ministry and beat themselves up because they feel they can't serve God in the same way. But they don't have to! God equips each of us with different skills, and one person's ministry will not be the same as another's. Many skills are required to build the kingdom of God. All we have to do is be willing to offer what we have!




# THURSDAY AFTERNOON LADIES...





# THE REFORMATION: QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS...

By Dr. Norman Nagel, professor emeritus, Concordia Seminary, St. Louis



A: A Christian cannot live a single day without the forgiveness of sins.

# 2. Is there reason still to be Lutheran?

A: The Lutheran tradition points only to Christ for our salvation, free and complete.

# 3. What hallmarks should we keep in mind when celebrating the Lutheran Reformation?

A: We are nothing but given to, that is, by grace and by faith. Grace alone, faith alone, Scripture alone — all mean by Christ alone. There is no other Christ than the one Scripture gives us, which is the instrument of the Holy Spirit for bestowing the gifts of life and salvation. Jesus said, "The words that I have spoken to you are Spirit and they are life" (John 6:63 ESV). That centers everything in Jesus, in and from Jesus. At the heart of our celebration is extolling Jesus — proclaiming and praising Him, for which our tradition supplies us with bountiful resources in liturgy and hymns. "One generation shall commend Your works to another, and shall declare Your mighty acts" (Psalm 145:4 ESV).

# 4. What cautions should be observed in celebrating the anniversary of the Reformation?

A: In celebrating the Reformation we should be cautious not speak scornfully of any other Christians who look only to Christ for their salvation and not to themselves.
