PASTOR NUECHTERLEIN'S MESSAGE

Thinking Ahead as This New Year Begins

Whenever we Christians come together for worship, each of us also brings with us memories from our past. We give thanks to God for the memories we cherish; and we ask His forgiveness for the memories we regret. But we also bring with us each Sunday troubling thoughts about the future:- thoughts about a difficult problem we must face at school or at work or at home – or thoughts about whether yet another crazed person somewhere in our country might, in a fit of rage, gun down another dozen people – or, if you're my age, thoughts about whether in your final days here on earth you may become a financial or physical burden to your spouse or your children or society. Whatever may be on your mind as you read this message, I'd like for you to think with me on this first Sunday of the new year about the future you and I face as Christians.

And even as we begin thinking together, we have to admit that there's a contradiction between what Jesus advises us and what we're inclined toward. Jesus says, "Do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will look after itself." But we're inclined to be anxious anyway, wondering, even worrying, about what each new day will bring.

Fortunately for us, the Bible assures us that the future is in God's hands – and that because it is, we don't have to be obsessed with worry. Nor are we to rely on the predictions of people who claim to be able to read the future in the stars, or in crystal balls. If our trust is firmly placed in God's promises as we know them from the Bible, we don't need any such so-called helps.

Yet although Jesus warns us not to worry about tomorrow, he does not mean that we should live as if there were no tomorrow. He himself looked ahead, seeing clearly the shadow of the cross on which He would die; and He warns us "to be ready, for the Son of Man is coming again at an hour we do not expect."

As we begin yet another new year, never has the shape of things to come been more unpredictable. You can ask the economists, or the students of foreign policy, or the businessmen, or the physicists, or the weathermen - and you get the same impression from them all – namely, that almost anything might happen. We could be on the threshold of a new era of peace and prosperity; or the entire civilized world could be pulverized by the destructiveness of a worldwide economic collapse – or by the demonic use of nuclear power. It's no wonder that if and when we dare to look into the future, we're inclined to be apprehensive.



BUT, and this is what matters most, by faith we can and do at all times and in all places "see Jesus" (Hebrews 2:9). And because we do, we can live in the midst of all this uncertainty without going berserk. No matter how much damage the devil manages to do, we can and do still believe that Jesus, our Savior/King will have the last word; and His last word to us who are His disciples will be this:- "Come, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the beginning of time."

Yes, the crystal ball is cloudy - by which I mean that we don't know what each new tomorrow will bring. But our hearts do not fail us, because the Jesus who tasted death as punishment for our sins was raised again to new life – to be our Savior and Lord – our Redeemer from sin - our Host with food from heaven here in Holy Communion - and the unseen guest at our every meal at home.

I'm struggling here to express a truth that is too glorious for words. So, I will stop writing now – and simply invite you to continue with me to "see Jesus" – to trust Him when He





On 12/17, upon recommendation of the call committee--the voters' of CLC unanimously voted to extend a call to the Rev. Dr. David Rowold. Pastor Rowold has a time frame of two to four weeks to pray on and consider our call.

Pastor Rowold was born in New York, where his father was a Lutheran Pastor. His family moved to Connecticut when his father received a call to serve a congregation there, and it is in Connecticut where our Pastor grew up. He attended public school in Connecticut, and upon his graduation from High School, enrolled in the Concordia University System, graduating Cum Laude from Concordia College in New York. After college, Pastor Rowold attended Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, MO, doing his Resident Field Education in North Saint Louis County and serving his Vicarage on Long Island, New York. It was just prior to his Vicarage that Pastor married his wife, Tricia.

Following his graduation from Seminary, Pastor was Ordained and Installed as the eleventh Pastor to serve Saint John's in NJ in its 115 year history. Pastor has also earned his Ph.D. from Drew University in Liturgical Studies; his doctoral dissertation was titled "English Language Liturgy in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod: It's Growth and Development."

District President's Comments dated 10/23/17:

David has been a steady and faithful pastor these 14 years he has served at St. John, Bloomfield. He does the fundamental tasks of the pastoral ministry well: preaching, witnessing, visitation. He is a very intelligent man who has a strong grasp of all theological subject matter and how they speak to an issue. He has been a good and active circuit visitor and has been helpful and faithful with every district task that has been entrusted to him.

As David has indicated, he has been at St. John for fourteen years now and he is ready to consider serving in another congregation.

Candidate's Comments dated May, 2017:

My strengths in ministry include preaching, leading worship, and teaching. I enjoy these greatly and find they are energizing. I have a genuine love of God and His people and desire to encourage the people of God and to help them know their Lord and His love for them. Also, I have been told that I do a good job thinking through situations and arriving at an approach to address them.

Since my ordination and installation on June 8, 2003, I have served as the sole pastor of the same congregation that called me right out of the seminary. After fourteen years, I have reached a point in my ministry that I feel God is calling me to serve elsewhere, to do ministry among His people in a different place. It is not an easy decision, but I believe it is the right one; it is time,




CLC CALENDARS FOR 2018...



MEET OUR MISSIONARIES...

J.P. and Aimee serve in northern Vietnam, where the LCMS has carried out human care and education projects for over 20 years. J.P. and Aimee work with local partners in developing and implementing community development projects in rural areas. They have also established a social enterprise to reach out to young families in the city. Moreover, J.P. and Aimee facilitate and oversee GEO personnel who teach EFL in universities in and around Hanoi, as well as short-term service teams from the United States and Asia.

J.P. was born and raised in Richmond, Va., received his undergraduate degree in theology from Lenoir-Rhyne College in North Carolina and received his Master of Divinity from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Mo., after serving in Vietnam for two years as a vicar. Aimee (Crawford) was born in Tulsa, Okla., and raised in Richmond, Va. She has both a bachelor's and a master's degree in dietetics from James Madison University in Virginia. J.P. and Aimee have two daughters — Celeste, born in March 2007, and Isabella, born in August 2009 and one Son, Isaac born this year in Vietnam.

Pictures from Play! café, an LCMS-sponsored social enterprise that Aimee started, partnered with another social enterprise, Tohe, that works with underprivileged kids, to hold a family event called KHOE Creative Festival (in Vietnamese, KHOE means to “show off,” as in to show off your creativity). Play! café only sponsored the event, but Tohe did a fantastic job of organizing it. Held at a lovely park, there were food stalls, craft stalls, and lots and lots of fun activities for kids. The Cima girls enjoyed spending most of the day there! Play! café had a booth, as well as activities for kids, including a large tarp that kids had fun running under. Some 1,500 people came to the event.

Let me tell you one of the many “ stories” from my decades as a Visiting Nurse. An elderly woman living alone (here in Cheshire) in the home her husband built was recovering from a fall. The problem.. the overhead light bulb in her kitchen had blown out and was well out of her reach. The kitchen was dark.. she would not ask any of the female caregivers to go down into the basement and drag up the ladder to change the bulb. I arrived with an observing male medical student. Immediately she asked him to get the ladder and change the bulb which he graciously did. She was so grateful.. just a little light bulb! I am sure there are many ways we can bring light to our fellow Christians!

In the tower of St. Bridget's Roman Catholic Church on Cheshire's Highland Avenue it hung.
Enjoyed by many for thirty years, and then around the year 1940 it ceased to be rung.

In 1958 a new St. Bridget's Church was dedicated on West Main Street with more appeal.
A developer named Gerald Gregoire now owned the old building with land and had a deal.

He converted the church building into Church Plaza where currently Cheshire Pizza resides.
Another event tragically occurred to Cheshire in 1967 and it is with that the bell coincides.

It relates to your Church's Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Richards' son Gary who had suddenly died.
On February 16 Gary was Cheshire's first casualty of Viet Nam and all initially just sighed.

His aunt Mrs. David Johnson of Monroe questioned what could be done for him and the
Church?

Pastor Nuechterlein suggested a Memorial Bell Fund to set that bell upon a permanent perch.

With a donated bell from Mr. Gregoire and wholehearted consent of the Richards to proceed,
The Voters' Assembly resolved establishing the Fund with donations to cover perceived needs.

Removing the bell from the old tower and erecting a modest structure to hang it had to be done.
Electrified for simple ringing and for shrubs and flowers to capture the eastern morning sun.

The architect was from Russell, Gibson and von Dohlen, a noted firm from West Hartford,
Who just happened to design seven years earlier the Sanctuary for worshipping our Lord.

Let it be known that the bell is said to be made of bronze, and weighs 350 pounds.
Caste in 1910 by McShane Bell Company of Baltimore for past, current and future sounds.

Although it again started tolling on a Christmas eve service in that year of 1967.
Dedicated as your Memorial Bell the next year on February 4 to call and help open the heavens.

NEWS FROM THE HOUSE AND GROUNDS DEACON...

Hello everyone,

It's been a busy year for our houses and grounds and I'd like to let you all know what we've done this year (a lot).

In the beginning of the year the council approved money for an AED (defibrillator) unit for the church. Working with the Red Cross, we purchased the unit and installed the case in May. I think we can all rest a little easier knowing we have this equipment if needed now.

In June the refrigerator in the kitchen stopped working and we replaced it. We also had one of our air conditioner units repaired this summer.

This fall Little Cherubs invited the police department to look over our facility and offer any recommendations. They recommended changing the locks and having a 'safe' room to shelter in case of emergencies. This led to replacing the locks and installing a lock box for the police and creating a safe room in one of the bathrooms.

The majority of our work this year has been the parsonage. Just before pastor Gustafson left in May, Ed Schweitzer and I walked through the parsonage taking notes and comments from pastor as to what work needed to be done. After pastor moved out, we began working to clean up the parsonage. I cannot begin to express my thanks for everyone that has helped over the past 6 months. From removing wallpaper and painting to completely gutting the basement to ripping up floors and doors and all the gardening and cleaning up outside we are blessed to have so many talented hard-working members. Here is a short list of the work we have done at the parsonage over the past 6 months:

- ✦ Repaired both chimney's
- ✦ Replaced the washer and dryer
- ✦ Removed wallpaper from 6 rooms and hallways
- ✦ All rooms and hallways painted along with the trim
- ✦ Repaired kitchen ceiling and scrapped popcorn finish
- ✦ All carpeting removed and upstairs hard wood floors refinished
- ✦ Replaced all interior doors and painted
- ✦ Downstairs hallway and kitchen tile floor removed and replaced with matching hardwood so now the first floor is all hardwood
- ✦ Basement had water damage and mold. Removed paneling, sheetrock, drop ceiling and tile floor. Had CT basement System come in and install a new water proofing system and sump pump and now basement is dry and protected
- ✦ Repaired basement sliding glass door
- ✦ Replaced oil tank and oil line to furnace
- ✦ Removed 6 bushes and 3 trees. Trimmed all the bushes and weeded all the gardens and removed rotted fence by garage

Still to be completed is the kitchen cabinets and counter top and kitchen lights, the family room carpet and fixtures in the downstairs bathroom. I fully expect to have the parsonage ready for our new Pastor by the end of January. You can tell from all this work that we have transformed the parsonage and everyone should be very proud of the hard work that has been done by a fantastic group of volunteers. I hope I don't miss anyone because I'd like to acknowledge everyone that has worked on this huge project: Ed and Nancy Schweizer, Tim and Karen Weiland, Dave and Sally Schrumm, Bill Sherman, Bill Soulier, Pat DiDomizio, Jim and Margie Mertz, Brad Schick, Alan and Carol Santoro, Pam and Avery Clark, John and Lynn Balash, Barbara Carson, John Casberg, Al Manke, Terri Daly, Todd Plantier, Jeff Mann, Bill Juul and Paul Greenhalgh. Again, I apologize if I've missed anyone and thank you again!

Lastly, we have prepared for the birth of our Lord. On the first Saturday of December a hearty crew set up our creche. A big thanks to Jeff Mann, Tim Weiland, Jim Mertz, Paul and John Greenhalgh, Larry Fiedler and Joe Stark. On Dec 15th and 16th we set up our beautiful tree and




SUNDAY MORNING COFFEE HOUR VOLUNTEERS NEEDED...
