Pastor's Message

'Teach me Your way, O Lord, that I may walk in Your truth." Psalm 86:11a (ESV)

Ask the members of just about any congregation who knows the Bible best in their Church, and the answer you most often get is "Pastor." The reasoning behind it is simply – the pastor is the person who went to school to learn about the Bible and to teach it to others, so he must know it the best. A decade and a half ago, when I was a new pastor freshly out of seminary, I sat in Bible study talking with one of those grandmothers: between my relative youth and her life experience, she had three times as many years in the Word as me. To be honest, I do not remember exactly what we were talking about that day (possibly a question about the previous Sunday's readings – a common source of conversation), but there was one thing she said that has stuck with me to this very day. She said, "Pastor, every time I read my Bible I learn something new." I still remember those words because they absolutely amazed me. Here was a woman who had been reading her Bible every day for over 80 about them. Encourage your children, grandyears, had taught the faith to her children and grandchildren, had attended Church and Bible study every Sunday, and had even been a Sunday School teacher for many decades, and she was learning something new every time she read her Bible.

I share this exchange with you for two reasons. The first is to encourage you to join us for Sunday School, Bible study, and Church on Sunday's, and to set aside time for your personal Scripture reading and devotion. The second is to remind you that the whole life of a Christian is a process of learning God's Word better and of growing in the faith. Every time we read the Scriptures, hear them read, listen to a sermon, or talk about them in Bible class is an opportunity to grow closer to our Heavwork in and through each and every one of us. Whether it something you are led to realtaught by the Pastor, there is always some-

thing more that we can learn from God's

Word in Holy Scripture.

As a new school year is about to start, I invite you to spend time in your Bible and to let the Lord teach you His way through His Word. Join me in Bible study; if you're already attending, maybe try speaking up a bit more (unless you're already talking almost as much as the Pastor). Come and gather with the rest of the body of Christ for Sunday service, as we're taught, fed, and nourished in Word and Sacrament (the Word made visible); if you're already here, perhaps serve as a reader or an usher. Pick up your Bible when you're at home and read it as a daily devotion; if that's currently part of your routine, get to-





the responses indicated there fast inn located in southern Vermont. With God's natural reminder of a few trees signaling the upcoming change of season, we at CLC resume our full schedule of activities of mission and ministry. To follow-up our June poll/survey, an ad hoc working group (Steve

Feero, David Schrumm, David Veleber, Priscilla Mulvaney, Craig Wilson, Pastor Rowold and me) met to review the responses to our brief survey to gauge our congregation's attitudes towards the times of our weekly worship services. Our survey provided a robust 122 responses and the responses indicated there was no compelling reason at this time to change from our schedule of two Sunday services that we have traditionally been following during September through mid-June. The Council and Voters Assembly will be encouraged to observe members' attendance at our worship services and education hours during the Fall and evaluate the topic in the near future. There was some interest expressed for a Saturday late afternoon service, so the Council and Voters Assembly should discuss this topic further.

So, beginning on Sunday, September 9th, we will resume our schedule of 2 Sunday worship services (8am and 10:30am) with our Education hour in between, including Sunday School for our youth and Adult Bible Study. Which leads me to encourage the parents of school-age children to make Sunday School and worship part of your family's weekly Sunday routine, as our Sunday School teachers are eager to help foster our Christian beliefs and values. Our Little Cherubs Christian Preschool also resumes its programs for both 3-year-old and 4-year -old children.

Like the innkeepers of a "B & B" welcome guests into their facilities, please remember to reach out to visitors here at CLC and welcome them into our parish family. Our Evangelism Committee will represent CLC with an information booth at the Cheshire Fall Festival & Marketplace on Saturday, September 15th. If you can help the Committee in our outreach effort by staffing the booth, even for 1 hour, contact Alan Spose. If you plan to visit the Fall Festival, but aren't able to staff the booth, please make a point to stop by and show your support.

For the ongoing stewardship of the affairs of the congregation, our Church Council will meet again on Thursday, September 6th at 7:00pm and our Voters' Assembly will meet again on Monday September 10th at 7:00pm.




An Appeal To Sunday School Parents:

NEWS FROM OUR YOUTH DEACON...

Tradition. What is a tradition? The standing definition is "the transmission of customs or beliefs from generation to generation". It sounds kind of dull when it is put like that. If you look at it from the point of view of the church congregation, it is to ensure that each generation fully believes and understands the importance of the sacrifice, our Lord and Savior made for us. This is a tradition that can be found in the Bible itself. Mark 16:15 "He said to them, 'Go into all the world and preach the Gospel to all creation.'" When thought of like that, the importance and beauty of the tradition are magnified, but the task of keeping it alive can seem quite daunting. So how is it that we keep it alive? The answer is we implement the use of smaller traditions that are included as a part of the whole tradition.

This brings me into the topic that the article is titled for and a couple of questions. How do we save a dwindling congregation? How do we get the youth to return to the faith? As we watch the size of our congregation decrease, it becomes easy for us to point fingers at anyone but ourselves. The questions I often hear thrown around while at church are, for example: How do we keep the internet from poisoning kid's minds, or how do we get parents to take responsibility in keeping their children involved, or how do we get the school system schedules to work around the church? I myself am guilty of posing questions like this. The real question we should be asking is; "How can the church change to entice a younger generation to stay faithful without compromising our core beliefs."



At this point, this probably seems a bitter subject for you but the reality is, life is not always so sweet. Matthew 15:3 - "Jesus replied, 'And why do you break the command of God for the **sake of your tradition?**" This is a powerful verse and I think it aptly applies to this situation. Through the stubborn retaining of some of our less important traditions, we in turn are killing one of our most important traditions, which is to spread the word of the Gospel. Now let me make sure I'm being understood properly. I'm not asking the church to go through a complete reform and rid of traditions that are at the core of our beliefs. I'm simply saying that we should examine some our less essential traditions and implement change to those, if they will help us retain youth and grow our congregation. Let me give you an example. I have several friends that now attend non-denominational churches, even though they were raised, Lutheran, Baptist, Catholic, etc. I have asked them why they switch and their #1 reason...... They don't like singing hymns. They prefer the contemporary service with newer music over the singing of hymns. Not once have I ever heard their reasons pertain to the content of the sermon, communion or any other essential tradition. It was simply the music. The irony? One of those friends told me their church has grown so large in the last year that they went from 2 to 4 services. I don't know about you but that's a tradition I would gladly change (even if it was for only one of our two services) if it meant we could obtain the same growth.

By now you are probably thinking I have gone off the rails, but let me make one simple point. All the hymns were new at some point. They were implemented by a generation long before ours and carried on as a tradition to help spread the Gospel. Even if we don't get rid of the old traditions, maybe it's time we add some new ones ourselves. If you truly want to save this congregation, you should start asking the younger generations what would interest them in staying. I'll bet you will be surprised how simple the answers are and how little they affect our core beliefs or traditions.










Consumed by my loss, I didn't notice the hardness of the pew where I sat. I was at the funeral of my dearest friend - my mother. She finally had lost her long battle with cancer. The hurt was so intense; I found it hard to breathe at times. Always supportive, Mother clapped loudest at my school plays, held a box of tissues while listening to my first heartbreak, comforted me at my father's death, encouraged me in college, and prayed for me my entire life. When mother's illness was diagnosed, my sister had a new baby and my brother had recently married his childhood sweetheart, so it fell on me, the 27-year-old middle female child without entanglements, to take care of her. I counted it an honor. 'What now, Lord?' I asked sitting in church. My life stretched out before me as an empty abyss. My brother sat stoically with his face toward the cross while clutching his wife's hand. My sister sat slumped against her husband's shoulder, his arms around her as she cradled their child. All so deeply grieving, no one noticed I sat alone. My place had been with our mother, preparing her meals, helping her walk, taking her to the doctor, seeing to her medication, reading the Bible together. Now she was with the Lord. My work was finished, and I was alone. I heard a door open and slam shut at the back of the church. Quick footsteps hurried along the carpeted floor.

An exasperated young man looked around briefly and then sat next to me. He folded his hands and placed them on his lap. His eyes were brimming with tears. He began to sniffle. 'I'm late,' he explained, though no explanation was necessary. After several eulogies, he leaned over and commented, 'Why do they keep calling Mary by the name of 'Margaret?" 'Because, that was her name, Margaret. Never Mary, no one called her 'Mary," I whispered. I wondered why this person couldn't have sat on the other side of the church. He interrupted my grieving with his tears and fidgeting. Who was this stranger anyway?



'No, that isn't correct,' he insisted, as several people glanced over at us whispering, 'her name is Mary, Mary Peters.' 'That isn't who this is.' 'Isn't this the Lutheran church?' 'No, the Lutheran church is across the street.' 'Oh.' 'I believe you're at the wrong funeral, Sir.' The solemnness of the occasion mixed with the realization of the man's mistake bubbled up inside me and came out as laughter. I cupped my hands over my face, hoping it would be interpreted as sobs. The creaking pew gave me away. Sharp looks from other mourners only made the situation seem more hilarious. I peeked at the bewildered, misguided man seated beside me. He was laughing too, as he glanced around, deciding it was too late for an uneventful exit. I imagined Mother laughing. At the final 'Amen,' we darted out a door and into the parking lot. 'I do believe we'll be the talk of the town,' he smiled. He said his name was Rick and since he had missed his aunt's funeral, asked me out for a cup of coffee.

That afternoon began a lifelong journey for me with this man who attended the wrong funeral, but was in the right place. A year after our meeting, we were married at a country church where he was the assistant pastor. This time we both arrived at the same church, right on time.

In my time of sorrow, God gave me laughter. In place of loneliness, God gave me love. This past June, we celebrated our twenty-second wedding anniversary. Whenever anyone asks us how we met, Rick tells them, 'Her mother and my Aunt Mary introduced us, and it's truly a match made in heaven.'

REMEMBER, God doesn't make mistakes. He puts us where we are supposed to be.


Sunrise September 11, 1931 ~ Sunset July 30, 2018 Marlene (Lindenau) Colavolpe
